I LEFT MY CHILDREN IN LIBERIA... I HAVE NOT SEEN THEM FOR 34 YEARS

A story 35 years in the making: From Africa to Green Card



"I had my bridal shop. Because of war in Africa, the bus stopped bringing things to my shop to sell. I was working before I came to this country. So I wanted to put the same principles here. I was working in a nursing home, in life insurance. I was doing a lot for myself, because I didn't want to put a burden on anyone; to be a liability on somebody. But because the immigration give me so hard time, my Temporary Protected Status expire, I wrote them, then they said they can't give it to me because it expire.

"When you hurt one person, you hurt a whole generation of that person."

"I left my children in Liberia for a war. If war had not come, I would have gone back long ago. To...to go and see my children. It breaks my heart. I think about my daughters in Liberia. I have not seen them for 34 years now. I want to see my children before I die. When you hurt one person, you hurt a whole generation of that person.

"I came to Stepping Stone and my case manager enrolled a lawyer for me to helping me with my paper. My case manager followed up on my paper business. She's been helping me. I don't know how to thank her for what she has done for me. I pray abundantly for her, for what she has done for me. She is so kind to me. She's very kind to me."

Now it's mid-2022 and we pick up with some very exciting news: Jatu received her Green Card! Here's an excerpt from a voicemail Jatu left Julie Jeppson just a few weeks ago: "Hello, Julie. This is Jatu. I just call you to tell you thank you for everything you have been doing for me. The lady and the lawyer brought me a Green Card on Friday, and I wanted to get it caught in my hand before I called you. The lawyer brought it to me on Friday. I want to say thank you for all you have been doing for me. You have helped my life and I will not forget that until the day I die. I just want to let you know I appreciate you very, very highly."
